Reading Room reopening news

As we close for the Christmas break, London is in Tier 4 and we are all hunkering down for the festive period as safely and cheerily as we can... but in a spirit of hopeful optimism, here are the details of our reopening procedure which will be effective if London is placed into a lower tier (including Tier 3) in time for the dates in question.

We are accepting provisional bookings via email to consult collections in our Reading Room on Tuesdays or Fridays only, for the period **12 January to 26 February 2021**.

If you'd like to make an appointment on this basis, here's what to do.....

We will ask you to suggest up to three preferred slots on Tuesdays or Fridays at the following times:

- **Morning:** 11am - 1.30pm
- **Afternoon:** 2pm - 4.30pm

Before we confirm your appointment, you'll need to identify and pre-order items from the

collection that you would like to look at. Not sure what we've got? Have a look at our [online catalogue](#). You may book two slots in the same day but no more than two per month.

If you have any queries please email us at localhistory@towerhamlets.gov.uk and we'll be happy to help. Please note that the inbox will not be monitored until 4 January.

To reiterate: We will be able to open the Reading Room on the date of your proposed appointment only if London has come out of Tier 4 by the date you are requesting.

Once we have confirmed your appointment, we will update you promptly if it needs to be rescheduled due to changes in government restrictions.

Finally, please note that there is no access to the building without a confirmed appointment. Please do not attempt to visit without one, and please do not attend your booked appointment if you develop COVID-19 symptoms (or live with someone who does). Holocaust Memorial Day 2021

Film screening: *La Boheme to Gardiners*

Thursday 28 January | 5.00-6.30pm | Free | Online event

As part of the borough's 2021 [Holocaust Memorial Day](#) programme we will be hosting a free online screening of a rare documentary from 1989 focussing on the Jewish community in the postwar borough.

La Boheme to Gardiners: the Sights and Sounds of the Jewish East End (49 mins) by director Aumie Shapiro showcases long-lost locations (many of which are still images from our collections) alongside the reminiscences of local residents. The journey meanders east from Gardiners Corner, a flashpoint in the anti-fascist uprising of 1936 better known as the Battle of Cable Street - down the road to Mile End, where the La Boheme cinema and ballrooms once stood.

This free screening will conclude with a discussion and Q&A led by Halima Khanom (Learning & Participation Officer) and Genova Messiah (Heritage Trainee). All are welcome!
