'East Endings': Film screening + Q&A



Filmed in <u>Bloom's</u>, the last kosher restaurant in Whitechapel, a group of Jewish East End writers, artists and activists including Rabbi Lionel Blue, Professor Bill Fishman, Anna Tzelniker, Simon Blumenthal, Barnett Litvinoff and Brian Sewell, meet-up on the occasion of their friend, artist, author and satirist Harry Blacker's 83rd birthday.

On the occasion of the 80th anniversary of VE Day, our archivists will select highlights from our wartime collections for you to explore in the Education Room. Drop in, have a cup of tea and meet others with similar interests.

This is an opportunity to browse archives documenting what was happening in the borough during the Second World War in an informal, unstructured session. Our collections on this topic are vast, and include council papers such as Air Raid incident files, bomb strike maps, and personal archives such as papers of the Veltman family, some whom were killed in the V2 rocket strike on Hughes Mansions, Vallance Road in March 1945.

Suitable for ages 14+, children must be supervised. No booking required.

Our current exhibition: The Brady Clubs

The Brady Boys' Club opened in 1896 in the heart of London's former Jewish East End and by 1925 the Brady Girls' Club was established, moving to purpose-built facilities in Hanbury Street E1 in 1935. Together, the Brady Clubs provided youth facilities and expanded the horizons of largely underprivileged young people for over 80 years.

The Brady Clubs: A Legacy for the Future is an immersive exhibition that explores the immense impact of youth provision on both the individuals concerned and society at large. The Brady Club's legacy stands as testament to the profound impact such initiatives can have and serves as an appeal to government, policymakers, community leaders, and the public to recognise the indispensable role of youth services in shaping positive life trajectories.

Throughout the exhibition, visitors are given the opportunity to engage with the Brady Club experience: through digital links to podcasts and stories, by listening to music, playing games, dressing up, and sitting in the canteen environment to read youth-generated Club magazines and examine Brady Club holiday albums.
