Announcing two new exhibitions



Exhibition | Saturday 1 March - Saturday 29 March | Free entry Venue: Tower Hamlets Town Hall, 160 Whitechapel Road, E1 4BJ

We invite you to discover untold stories of Black lives 300 years ago in London's East End. <u>Communities of Liberation</u> is a new public exhibition bringing to light Black experiences in Tower Hamlets during the transatlantic Slave Trade.

The exhibition is based on the research and creative work of six local residents who have used Tower Hamlets' archive collections to tell stories of the lives of Africans who lived in the East End between 1567 and 1802. These include...

- o Sabinah, transported from Jamaica, who found refuge in Whitechapel
- o Pompey, a trumpet player in Bethnal Green
- o Ann, a "Negro maid" in Limehouse who escaped from her captor

The exhibition features artwork, poetry, podcasts, and creative writing, as well as the archival sources which inspired the Co-Producers.

Researched and created by the Communities of Liberation team, in collaboration with Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives.

Supported by Historic England and Tower Hamlets Council.

The exhibition will be on show between 1 - 29 March in the new Tower Hamlets Town Hall, located between reception and the Grocers Wing. It will be open to the public Monday to Friday, 9am to 6.30pm.


Exhibition | Friday 14 March - Saturday 21 June | Free

The Brady Boys' Club opened in 1896 in the heart of London's former Jewish East End and by 1925 the Brady Girls' Club was established, moving to purpose-built facilities in Hanbury Street E1 in 1935. Together, the Brady Clubs provided youth facilities and expanded the horizons of largely underprivileged young people for over 80 years.

The Brady Clubs: A Legacy for the Future is an immersive exhibition that explores the immense impact of youth provision on both the individuals concerned and society at large. The Brady Club's legacy stands as testament to the profound impact such initiatives can have and serves as an appeal to government, policymakers, community leaders, and the public to recognise the indispensable role of youth services in shaping positive life trajectories.

Throughout the exhibition, visitors will be given the opportunity to engage with the Brady Club experience: through digital links to podcasts and stories, by listening to music, playing games, dressing up, and sitting in the canteen environment to read youth-generated Club magazines and examine Brady Club Holiday albums.

From 'The Blind Beggar of Bethnal Green' to 'Bonkers', the people of London's East End have always appreciated a good tune. Our unique history, shaped by its connection to the river as a source of inspiration, work and migration has produced an extraordinary musical legacy, spanning everything from folk songs and sea shanties to music hall, jazz, punk, the Asian underground and grime. Featuring over a hundred rare items selected by staff from the collections of Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives, Cockney Rebels: Popular Music in Tower Hamlets, 1624-2003 is a major new exhibition exploring how our borough and its people have inspired and shaped popular music, both locally and globally, over four centuries.

The *Cockney Rebels* book is now available - online sales coming soon but meanwhile you can pick up a copy for £12 from the archive or your local Idea Store or library.

Annual closure of the Reading Room


We will be closed to visitors between **Monday 24 February and Friday 7 March**. Staff will be carrying out vital annual stocktaking and work on our collections including:

This new project seeks to capture the rich evolutionary history of Bangla Natok (Bengali drama) in East London through oral history and research. It will explore theatre, storytelling, playwriting, and community progression in East London from 1963 to 2013.

Project participants will explore how small group of people kept Bengali drama alive when they first migrated to London, and community experiences such as racism, decline of local industries, the closure of the docks, resistance, and rising unemployment. The Cockney Yiddish podcast

Launching today, **The Cockney Yiddish Podcast** uncovers the vibrant yet little-known Jewish popular culture of London's East End. Spanning seven episodes—six in English and one in Yiddish—the series brings to life newly unearthed songs, stories, and voices from the 1880s to the 1950s, offering a fresh perspective on immigrant life in London.

Yiddish was the language spoken by Jews from Eastern Europe before the Second World War. When tens of thousands of Jewish migrants arrived in London escaping poverty and pogroms, they brought Yiddish with them, leading to the development of a rich Cockney-Yiddish culture in the East End.

Hosted by historians <u>Professor Nadia Valman</u> and Dr Vivi Lachs from Queen Mary University of London, the podcast delves into the fascinating intersections of Cockney and Yiddish cultures. Special guests include Michael Rosen, Miriam Margolyes, David Schneider, and musicians from <u>Klezmer Klub</u> and Katsha'nes, who add depth and personal experience to the storytelling.

us from an Irish noblewoman living in the sixteenth-century Tower of

the Isle of Dogs, meeting lodging-house keepers, Famine refugees,
nuns, strike leaders, suffragettes and local politicians along the way.
