
Land and Lives in Bromley-by-Bow



Key Stage Two Teacher's Learning Pack

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Teacher's notes

Flanking the western bank of the River Lea, Bromley-by-Bow is bordered by Bow to the north, Mile End and Limehouse to the west and Poplar to the south.

Of the present day borough of Tower Hamlets, Bromley-by-Bow was the last neighborhood to lose the character of a rural village. In medieval times much of it lay in the ecclesiastical manor belonging the nunnery of St Leonard. The Four Mills in Bromley (not to be confused with the Three Mills on the eastern bank) were used as flour mills, supplying Londoners with bread, and as fulling mills (watermills adapted for beating cloth).






gardens and pasture, its residences were sought after by wealthy and titled families.

In 1770, a waterway called the Limehouse Cut was opened, stimulating the growth of new industries. The lower manor house, Bromley Hall, became the centre of a large calico printworks, specialising in copper-plate printed textiles. The new century saw this new class of industrialists succeeding the titled classes as major landowners. The further development of industry, including the unpopular chemical industries, transformed the parish. Numerous streets of terraced housing were laid out after 1850 for the growing working population, which rose from about 3,500 in 1811 to 70,000 by 1891.

Though some slum clearance had begun before World War II, it was not until after the Blitz that a major transformation of Bromley's landscape took place, which saw the disappearance of the vast majority of its streets of Victorian terraces

With the dissolution of religious houses in England, the nunnery's lands came into the hands of the Crown, and afterwards the manor of Bromley appears divided into an upper and a lower part. During the early 17th century, two fine mansions were built in the upper manor: Bromley Palace and Bromley Hall, the first of which may originally have been intended for the use of James I. By the early 18th century, Bromley village was known as an upper-class area. Separated from the city and the docks by land given over to market




and the development of new social housing, including the Teviot Estate, south of the Limehouse Cut, and the Abbott Estate to the east.

In the late 20th and 21st centuries, the decline of industry has seen the construction of many blocks of private flats, most particularly adjacent to the Limehouse Cut.


Note: The image on page 9 is of East India Dock Road, looking towards the docks, during 1924.


Section from 1746 Roque map

Section from 1985 Ordnance Survey map



Indenture

'Indenture' = an important agreement between two or more people.

'**Deed**' = a document that tells us who owns a piece of land or a building.

'Parish' = an area that has, or used to have, its own church
