

A title deed showing a plan for a terraced house on Oban Street, Bromley-by-Bow, c1874


Over the last 18 months, Project Archivist Mark Ballard and his wonderful team of volunteers have been busy re-cataloguing and indexing our extensive collection of title deeds. As this project comes to an end, we are very pleased to launch the Land and Lives pop-up exhibition - which focusses on what title deeds can tell us about the often overlooked but fascinating history of Bromley-by-Bow. Our archivists will give talks on the highlights of this collection and will launch a new leaflet which explains how to use the deeds for different types of historical research, including genealogy; in addition to a KS2 learning resource we have developed for Tower Hamlets schools. Radiant Affinities: Artworks by Cornelius McCarthy

The latest exhibition at Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives, which launched on Thursday 12 February to mark LGBT History Month, celebrates the work of the British painter Cornelius McCarthy (1935 - 2009). McCarthy was born and brought up in Stepney, educated at local Roman Catholic schools and trained at Toynbee Hall and Whitechapel Upper Gallery before attending Goldsmiths' College of Art. His work can be found in private collections worldwide but is still

relatively unfamiliar to London audiences.

This exhibition marks the acquisition of several of McCarthy's sketchbooks by THLHL&A, as well as bringing together works from the collections of friends and admirers. McCarthy drew early inspiration for his painting from the waterfront and townscape of the East End, and memories of Stepney remained with him throughout his career. Later work reflected the period of unprecedented social, cultural and political change through which he lived, from postwar London to the sexual politics and ideological struggles of the 21st century. The exhibition is on show until Thursday 7 May.

The Whitechapel Gallery welcomes residents from the London Borough of Tower Hamlets to visit the critically acclaimed exhibition Adventures of the Black Square: Abstract Art and Society 1915 - 2015 for free on Tuesday 3 March 2015. Tracing a century of Abstract art, this major exhibition brings together over 100 works by 100 modern masters and contemporary artists from Carl Andre and Piet Mondrian to David Batchelor and Sophie Taeuber-Arp. It takes a fresh look at abstraction for a modern age, and asks how art relates to society. The exhibition includes paintings, sculptures, film and photographs brought together from major international collections and begins with one of Kazimir Malevich's famous 'black square' paintings.

The Whitechapel Gallery is free and open throughout the year, with one annual ticketed exhibition. The Free Day has been established to enable the Gallery's neighbours in the Tower Hamlets community to enjoy this major exhibition for free.
