George Lansbury's census submission in 1911.

Sunday 21 March is Census Day and every household in England and Wales will be asked to take part in the unique survey which has taken place in its current form every 10 years since 1841 – except during the Second World War.

The census provides a crucial snapshot of the nation and helps to plan and fund public services. So, it's important that everyone is counted, because besides the benefits to historians of the future, census data helps to ensure local areas receive a fair and appropriate share of public funding. Households in Tower Hamlets are now receiving letters in the post which include a unique code to complete the census online - it's now digital for the first time in census history! But if this presents difficulties, paper copies of the form can be requested by anyone who needs one.

If you've researched local or family history you know just how important historical census records are when trying to discover information about the past. As part of Women's History Month we are delighted to present a free online screening of a 1997 documentary from our collections recently digitised, which tells the story of a Jewish East End icon.

Miriam Moses OBE (1886-1965) was a social activist, reformer and the first female mayor of the London Borough of Stepney.

Known as 'The Angel of the East End' Miriam began her social work at the age of 18. This film follows her endeavours, from her time as a nurse, her contributions to the Jewish League for Women's Suffrage, and the founding of the Brady Girl's Club in 1925 which provided essential aid and social support to local Jewish families and children.

The Reading Room will be open on an appointments basis from Tuesday 13 April, for two days a week initially. As before, there are procedures in place to ensure everyone's safety:

- You'll need to pre-book an appointment to visit us. Slots will be available on Tuesdays and Fridays at the following times:
 - Morning: 11am -1.30pm
 - Afternoon: 2pm -4.30pm
- You will need to pre-order items from the collection that you'd like to look at. The full range of our resources, including periodicals on microfilm, will be available. Not sure what we've got? [Search our collections catalogue](#).
- Free access to Ancestry.com will also be available onsite, using a PC or on your own device.

- Our events programme will remain online -no public gatherings will be taking place in the building for the time being.

Please note that as previously, the approved timeline for libraries to reopen is contingent on the latest government restrictions, so this date may be subject to change. Assignment of lease to Judah Levy (B/LEV/1)

Stories from our property title deeds

Property title deeds are an important source in documenting land ownership and changing landscapes sometimes providing astonishing or unexpected levels of detail. We have recently catalogued a collection of title deeds relating to 197 Roman Road (later 203 Roman Road), Old Ford (reference B/LEV/1).

Dating from 1875 to 1919 the bundle of deeds charts the occupiers and owners through successive leases. Plans of the premises are included. The most recent document is an assignment of the lease in 1919 to **Judah Levy**, fruit and greengrocer.

The 1911 census describes Judah Levy as a fruiterer living at 33 Mossford Street, Burdett

Road, Mile End.

Cross-referring with earlier censuses, we discover that Judah Levy was born in Aldgate in c.1886. In c.1908 he and Amelia married, she having also been born in Aldgate in c.1885. When Judah Levy was assigned the lease and moved in 1919 to 203 Roman Road he was living at 57 Strahan Road, Bow.

According to a member of the wider family who donated these records, Judah Levy owned the business. He and wife Amelia (also spelled Amella) lived behind the Roman Road shop. The premises also had space for their horse and cart. The building was bombed during the Second World War (1939-1945) so they later moved across the road to an empty shop. They had no children. Amella Levy outlived her husband and died in the 1960s.

Although our opening hours have sadly been very limited for most of 2020, this is consistent with the preceding years' data which showed that ethnic groups, migrants and race relations was also the most popular research subject in 2018 and 2019.
