
Researchers are welcome to book a provisional appointment to use our Reading Room in December. To do so:

Image: Elevation Plan of the King John's Workmen's Dwellings, Limehouse Causeway, 1904




Artists announced for Bangladesh 50 Years

We are pleased to announce the appointment of Ruhul Abdin as Lead Artist for the Bangladesh 50 Years Project. Ruhul founded participatory design and architecture studio [Paraa](#) and is based between Dhaka, Bangladesh and Bow, Tower Hamlets. Ruhul is also a portrait artist and has created works sensitively representing Bengali people and capturing events as they take place. Ruhul will be working with 15 British Bangladeshi Citizen Researchers to explore the significance of the 1971 Bangladesh Liberation War through collections held at the Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives. The researchers' findings will inform a public artwork produced by Ruhul to be displayed outdoors in Tower Hamlets.

Ruhul is joined by the [Rainbow Collective](#) a documentary production and training company based in Brick Lane. Hannan Majid and Richard York, the duo behind the company will work to capture the discussions and explorations of the Citizen Researchers which will form the digital legacy of the project, hosted on the [National Portrait Gallery](#) website.

Newly Catalogued Collections

During October staff were able to return to our physical collections and prioritise cataloguing. Some highlights from recent catalogue updates include:

Act 'impowering the respective militias of London, the Hamlets of the Tower, Southwark and Westminster to raise foot'.

This act enabled the right to recruit men from the surrounding hamlets in the East End at the very end of the Civil War. Published in 1651 the by House of Commons of Oliver Cromwell's English Commonwealth, the act is among the early printed references we hold to the phrase which gave the modern London Borough of Tower Hamlets its name. This newly acquired pamphlet (reference: [LC15107](#)) joins related militia acts already held in the Library.

Bethnal Green Borough War Memorial Committees

After the First World War (1914-1918) the Metropolitan Borough of Bethnal Green worked with local organisations to plan a war memorial. The purpose of the memorial was to commemorate individuals from Bethnal Green who served their country and lost their lives. We hold signed minutes and fund papers relating to planning the war memorial (archive series reference: [L/BGM/A/28](#)).

In 1920 it was recommended that a War Memorial should take form of: - a Roll of Honour on vellum to record names of those who gave their lives in service to their country, to be available on public view in the library; - a stained glass window at the head of the staircase leading to the library's Reference Department and Lecture Hall; - a bronze tablet stating the particulars of the Memorial. A Bethnal Green War Memorial Fund was set up and handed to the Public Libraries Committee to provide the Memorial.

We hold a photocopy of index cards of the Bethnal Green Roll of Honour. The cards are alphabetical by surname and give address, name of unit and date of death.

Citizens Advice Bureau

This collection consists of records of Bethnal Green Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB) dating from 1942-1980s. Based at St Margaret's House, the branch like all CAB provided free advice to individuals on their rights and responsibilities and helped form policies for social change. Branches are ultimately governed by the National Association of Citizens Advice Bureau which was established in 1939.

There are minutes, reports, correspondence including papers on Bow branch and a brochure on the history of the CAB in Tower Hamlets published in circa 1989. Some records contain personal information and are therefore is subject to access restrictions under data protection. Explore more here [I/CAB](#)
