# **African and Caribbean Family History Day**

# Saturday 7 October, 10.30am-4.00pm

We're pleased to announce the full programme for our African and Caribbean Family History Day, run in partnership with the <u>Tony Cheeseman Foundation</u>. Visitors will have the opportunity to get help researching African and Caribbean ancestors, find out more about black heritage in London's East End and browse a number of displays and stalls, including a Hansib Publications book stall (50% discount). The following talks will take place throughout the day:



# 11.00: Tracing Black Ancestry: Secrets of the 1817 Slave Registers Uncovered

Family historian and author Paul Crooks will give an account of how he traced his ancestors from suburban North London to Jamaica and ultimately back to the Gold Coast of Africa, and gained international recognition for his breakthroughs in African-Caribbean genealogical research.

# 12 noon: Introduction to Researching your Caribbean Ancestry

Join genealogist Sharon Tomlin for this introductory talk on how to begin tracing your Caribbean ancestry. Sharon is an experienced family historian and runs a variety of workshops and classes on tracing Caribbean ancestry.

### 1.00: Mini Talks

Grab some food and listen to a variety of short, 10 minute talks, including one by Tower Hamlets African & Caribbean Mental Health Organisation (THACMHO), a voluntary group which has played a leading role in researching and publicising the African and Caribbean history of London's East End.

# 2.00: African and Caribbean History at The National Archives

Sandra Shakespeare from The National Archives gives an introductory talk on the records available at TNA and how they can help you to discover more about African and Caribbean history and ancestry.

**3.00: 30 years from Black History Month: what are the Key lessons for family history?** Join Patrick Vernon OBE, social commentator and leading expert on African and Caribbean genealogy in the UK, for this fascinating talk. Patrick is the founder of Every Generation Media and 100 Great Black Britons, and is also Editor-in-Chief of Black History Month Magazine and a campaigner for Windrush Day as a public holiday.



### **New Exhibition!**

# A necessary fiction 5 October 2017 - 20 January 2018

Launching next week as part of Black History Month, *A necessary fiction* is a new exhibition of artwork by ceramicist **Basil Olton**, which explores the untold history of anti-imperialist black activism in interwar London. The work is inspired by Chris Braithwaite, also known as Chris Jones, a resident of Stepney, trade unionist and founder of the Colonial Seamen's Association who worked and organised in the East End during the 1930s and 1940s.

The histories of people of African and African-Caribbean descent are often overlooked in East End heritage, with other migrant experiences tending to be foregrounded. However, due to the central role our docks and docklands have played in the legacy of British colonialism, much black history resides in Tower Hamlets waiting to be uncovered.



Basil Olton, a ceramics artist and a colleague in <u>Idea Store Learning</u> - Tower Hamlets Council's adult and community education service - approached us some years ago, keen to use our extensive heritage collections here to inspire the creation of new artwork responding to the borough's hidden black histories.

Basil was immediately drawn to the life and work of Chris Braithwaite, who also used the pseudonym Chris Jones. Originally from Barbados, Braithwaite was a former seaman turned revolutionary activist who lived at Turners Road, Stepney, with his wife and family from 1929 to his untimely death in 1944. He campaigned tirelessly for equal employment rights in the maritime industries for colonial seamen and for the liberation of Africa and the Caribbean from imperial rule.

Surviving archives documenting aspects of Braithwaite's life - including his surveillance by the state, held at <a href="The National Archives">The National Archives</a> - have been manipulated by the artist using a range of print, ceramic and textile forms. Tower Hamlets Local History Library & Archives is thrilled to host this exhibition of artwork which demonstrates so vitally that history – and the process of

trying to access it in institutional archives - is always political, as well as personal. We are very grateful to the Arts Council and to the Rail and Maritime Transport Union (RMT) for providing grants for this exhibition, which will enable a youth arts programme for local residents and workshops for schools to be delivered alongside it.

The exhibition will be accompanied by a programme of free public events - more will be added shortly!

# Talk: Pan-Africanism, anti-imperialism and the Left in interwar London Thursday 26 October, 6:30 - 7:30pm

From the Scottsboro protests to the Italian invasion of Ethiopia, this talk by Hakim Adi (Professor of the History of Africa and the African Diaspora, University of Chichester) will consider the activities and campaigns of the International African Service Bureau, of which Chris Braithwaite was Secretary. The IASB was a Pan-Africanist organisation committed to trade unionism and anti-imperialism. Free, no booking required.

# Talk: Love and loss in mid-century multicultural Stepney Thursday 7 December, 6:30 - 7:30pm

Join Dr Rob Waters (University of Sussex) for this talk focusing on local educationalist Edith Ramsay, who lived and worked in Stepney during the 1940s and 1950s and became deeply involved with the transnational lives of Stepney's African, Caribbean and South Asian populations. The letters in her archive (held here at THLHLA) reveal lives disrupted by war, illness and poverty, but also give an intimate insight into convivial life and love in Stepney, and its identity as a historic multicultural centre. 
# Family Fun at the Archives Monday 23 October, 11:00am - 12:30pm



# New Somali East End project



Numbi Arts are leading a community arts project called <u>Coming Here: Being Here</u> – archiving British Somali heritage in the East End of London.
