Brief Description of Course What will the course cover?	This interactive course is designed to build on your existing skills in speaking, listening, reading and writing. The focus in lessons will be on oral communication. You will practise your language in conversation with other learners. This practice will be supervised and when necessary help and clarification given. By the end of the course you will be at Level B1 of the Common European Framework for Reference for Languages.		
Entry Requirements	You will need to have completed Spanish Intermediate Parts 1 and 2, have studied Spanish for approximately 160 hours, or be nearing Level B1 of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages.

What examination or assessment will there be and what will it involve?

There is no examination with this course.

A tutor conducted initial assessment will be followed by on-going assessment of progress and achievement. After 5 weeks, there will be a controlled assessment and another towards the end of the course.

How will I know I am making progress?

Your tutor will give you continuous feedback on your oral and written work as well as suggestions for improvement. You will have an individual learning plan to monitor your own progress. The tutor will keep a record of your work and performance and discuss this with you. You will gain more from the course if you commit study time to it outside the classroom.

Is there anything else I need to know?

We expect you to attend all classes, be on time and complete any homework given by your tutor
